Class news for this week


Reception have been working really hard practising their phonics and letter writing. We have been writing sentences about our story Iris and Isaac.

Isn't our writing amazing?






Year 1 have been busy reading poems about spring. We were inspired by Shirley Hughes "Out and About". We first revisited our seasons from our Science lessons in Autumn. Then looked at key things that we would need, see or use during Spring. We are very pleased with our group work.




Year 2 have been conducting experiments in science and RSHE. In science they have been testing the stretchiness of different materials. In RSHE we used different types of drinks to cover egg shells (as substitute for teeth) to see what effects they would have on our body. The children loved seeing the results!



In DT Year 3 children have been contemplating a design for a pneumatic toy. They have investigated and shared lots of ideas about how pneumatics work and these are some of the designs that they came up with last week.





Class news for this week

This week the children in Year 4 completed their soap sculptures! After a lot of planning and practising with the tools, the final results have arrived. In Art we have been learning about 3D compositions and the time and effort involved in creating such a piece. Well done year 4.



This week in Art, Year 5 have finished working on their poem portraits. First, the children designed their own portraits with a challenge attached; do not lift your pencil off the paper! Then, they chose from two poems all about growing up and traced the words carefully around their portrait to create the final piece.

During this year, Mrs Govern has worked really hard on the library and has put in place an excellent team of Year 6 Reading Role Models to spread their love of reading around the school. They have been working as ambassadors for reading since before Christmas, so we thought it was about time we introduced them. Their duties include bringing younger classes to use the library, supporting during reading workshop and generally sharing their love of reading and books!

Parking at drop-off and pick-up times

Pick-up and drop-off times are busy outside school. This can cause an increased safety risk to both children and parents/carers.

Parking restrictions outside schools are there to keep you and your children safe. Parking inconsiderately can put people in danger and you also risk being fined. It's important that motorists follow the <u>Highway</u> Code.

Put child safety before your convenience

Safety tips for parking outside school

When picking up or dropping off children at school, you should do the following:

- Allow yourself plenty of time as the area is likely to be busy.
- Do not allow children to exit the car and run across to school while parked in the middle of the road.
- Do not park on yellow zigzag lines and do not double-park opposite them.
- If necessary, park further away and walk the short distance to school.

Lateness and the impact on learning

Lateness to school can significantly disrupt a child's learning experience. Arriving late often means missing crucial instructional time, which can affect their ability to grasp foundational concepts. This interruption can also create anxiety or embarrassment, leading to lack of confidence and disengagement. Over time, frequent lateness may contribute to a poor understanding of key lessons, ultimately hindering academic progress and making it harder for children to catch up with their peers.

Listed below is the work your child will be missing if they are late into school (up to 9.30am):

<u>Reception:</u> name recognition, letter formation or tricky word writing, social time with friends (free choice play once morning task has been finished), whole class carpet time - communication and language - going through the date and our visual timetable for the day. Reading or phonics.

- Year 1: Morning Maths (3 times a week), practical problem solving sessions (twice a week), handwriting practice and phonics
- Year 2: Morning maths, gap task time, spelling and dictation
- Year 3: Morning maths and first part of the maths lesson
- Year 4: Morning maths and maths interventions
- Year 5: Morning maths, going through the daily timetable and the beginning of the maths lesson.

<u>Year 6</u>: Morning maths, and then the first half of the maths lesson (all of the input) and on Wednesdays the start of the science lesson

Reminder: School starts at 8.50am and ends at 3.20pm

We still have a high number of children arriving late each morning. We will be monitoring this closely next term and taking

actions to improve this. It is a parent's duty to make sure their child arrives at school on time. Children can arrive at school between <u>8.40am and 8.50am</u>. Children arriving after 8.50am are marked as late on the register.

School finishes at 3.20pm, please ensure you are here to collect your child no later than 3.20pm. Persistent late collection will result in your children being looked after by Wrap-Around staff and the Wrap-Around fee of £8.50 will be charged. Please note Wrap-Around must be booked in advance - please do not assume that if you are late there will be a place in

Wrap-Around for your child. You must aim to collect your child on time at 3.20pm and no later.



Parents are <u>legally responsible</u> for ensuring their children attend school everyday.

With new government measures in place from August 2024 we will be monitoring attendance rigorously next term and contacting parents directly.

Any unauthorised absence or persistent absence will be recorded on your child's attendance records and this may result in legal proceedings against you.
